A RETURN TO THE XIXTH CENTURY?

The year 2024 brought a dramatic regression in press freedom worldwide, shaking the very foundations of our democracies. It was the aggravation of an ongoing trend: over the past decade, the Reporters Without Borders (RSF) World Press Freedom Index has turned increasingly red.

Authoritarian leaders now openly display contempt for journalism, oligarch-driven media campaigns further suppress independent reporting, public distrust in the press is widespread and generative artificial intelligence (AI) has accelerated journalism's loss of control over its own sector. The hard-won press freedom gains of the 20th century are at greater risk than ever, raising fears of a return to a 19th-century world dominated by robber barons, populist autocrats and manipulated masses.

In early 2024, RSF observed that political forces were increasingly obstructing journalists' work. It seems we are now in a world where might makes right and that we are breaking away from the international order established after World War II.

Facing this chaos, how can we rebuild a strong, independent media landscape? The solution will require serious determination and resolve — two qualities ingrained in the DNA of RSF. Through legal action, the protection of journalists, the deployment of crisis response programmes, unblocking censored websites and directly engaging with world leaders (including authoritarian regimes), RSF made a lasting impact in 2024.

The NGO, which will soon turn 40, has learned to sustain long-term efforts as well as anticipate and deliver solutions to upcoming crises. This ability to identify and solve problems with great imagination may be Christophe Deloire's greatest legacy. The late RSF Secretary General, who tragically passed away on 8 June 2024, dedicated his life to press freedom.

In 2025, RSF will focus on new solutions and methods of mobilisation. These include raising public awareness — especially among young people — and creating specific tools that expose and combat propaganda, the antithesis of journalism. RSF remains steadfast in its fight for independent, pluralistic journalism, the protection of journalists and the right to reliable information.

A heartfelt thank you to everyone who supports our work, which has never been more vital.

JANUARY

THANKS TO RSF, THE INTERNATIONAL CRIMINAL COURT (ICC) RECOGNISES CRIMES AGAINST JOURNALISTS IN ITS INVESTIGATION INTO THE WAR IN PALESTINE

Following two complaints RSF filed with the ICC, the office of ICC Prosecutor Karim Khan confirms that crimes against journalists will now be included in its investigation into war crimes committed in Palestine. Since 2018, RSF advocacy has been instrumental in ensuring the ICC investigates crimes against journalists.

FEBRUARY

LANDMARK RULING BY THE FRENCH COUNCIL OF STATE IN "RSF VS. ARCOM/CNEWS"

The French Council of State, France's highest administrative court, overturns the decision made by the national broadcast regulator ARCOM to take no action against CNews, a television channel that breached requirements concerning the truthfulness, independence and pluralism of broadcast information under French law. The Council of State's ruling marks a major victory for media pluralism and independence.

MARCH

RELEASE OF THE RSF DOCUMENTARY "FIXERS IN WARTIME" AND LAUNCH OF THE SVOBODA SATELLITE PACKAGE

RSF screens its French-language documentary "Fixers in Wartime," which follows three Ukrainian war fixers, unsung heroes who help journalists report from conflict zones. RSF also launches Svoboda, a satellite TV and radio package that broadcasts independent journalism into Russia, Belarus, occupied Ukraine, and the Baltic states - proof that democracies can export independent journalism as a bold countermeasure to authoritarian propaganda.



Ukraine officially joins the international coalition — launched by RSF and the French government in 2019 to promote the democratic governance of the information space — becoming its 53rd signatory.

RSF unveils The Propaganda Monitor, a multimedia project exposing propaganda's key actors and the multifaceted ways it is created and spread worldwide. The battle against propaganda and disinformation is central to the RSF mission to protect trustworthy journalism.

SEPTEMBER

RSF AND OVER 500 COMMUNITY RADIO STATIONS DEFEND LOCAL JOURNALISM IN THE SAHEL REGION

At a press conference in Bamako, RSF and over 500 community radio stations call for stronger protection of local journalism in the Sahel.

The call is aired in six languages by RSF partner radio stations.





OCTOBER

RSF RELEASES "JOURNALISM IN THE #METOO ERA," A REPORT ON JOURNALISTS COVERING WOMEN'S RIGHTS AND GENDER-BASED VIOLENCE

RSF publishes its exclusive report, "Journalism in the #MeToo Era," seven years after the first media investigation into the Weinstein affair in the US triggers public debates worldwide. The report includes recommendations to protect journalists reporting on women's rights and gender-based violence.

NOVEMBER

RSF LAUNCHES FUNDRAISING DRIVE, "WITHOUT BORDERS. BUT NEVER WITHOUT YOU"

Because the right to reliable information is severely threatened, RSF launches a donation campaign urging the public to help defend journalists and journalism.

DECEMBER

THE RSF PRESS FREEDOM AWARDS HONOUR JOURNALISTS DEFENDING PRESS FREEDOM WORLDWIDE ON 3 DECEMBER IN WASHINGTON, D.C.

Eighteen journalists and journalist teams, two media outlets and five photojournalists were nominated for RSF Press Freedom Prizes. They competed in five categories, including the brand new **Mohamed Maïga Prize for African Investigative Journalism**, which honours the memory of the Malian investigative journalist and his fight to uphold social justice in Africa through his writing.



PRESS FREEDOM VIOLATIONS IN 20



IN 2024, JOURNALISM PAID AN EXORBITANT HUMAN COST DUE TO ARMED CONFLICTS AND REPRESSIVE REGIMES

Journalists don't just die - they're killed.

Journalists don't just die – they're killed. They're not just in prison – regimes lock them up. They don't just disappear – they're kidnapped.

The 2024 RSF Round-up revealed a disturbing escalation in attacks against journalists, particularly in conflict zones, where half of all journalist murders recorded this year took place.

Gaza was the deadliest region for journalists in 2024 and the most dangerous place to report from in the past five years. Since October 2023, the Israeli military has killed over 145 journalists, one-third of all journalists killed worldwide in 2024. At least 35 were deliberately targeted due to their work.

What's more, **550** journalists are currently imprisoned globally, marking a **7** per cent increase from 2023. These violent crackdowns, often carried out by governments or armed groups, continue with total impunity.

We need to get things moving, to remind ourselves that journalists are dying for us — to keep us informed. We must keep counting, naming, exposing, investigating, and fighting for justice. Fatalism cannot prevail.

Protecting those who inform us means protecting the truth.

JOURNALISM UNDER POLITICAL PRESSURE

ranking in the RSF World Press Freedom Index, the political indicator saw the most significant drop worldwide in 2024, with a global decline of 7.6 points.

The 2024 Index also found that over 50 per cent of the global population lives in a country or territory where press freedom is classified as "very serious," while less than 8 per cent live in areas where press freedom is considered "good" or "satisfactory."

In 2024, over half of the world's population was called to the polls. The press freedom crisis became even more pronounced during elections, as seen by the grave violations of the right to reliable information recorded in the five most populous countries marked in red on the 2024 World Press Freedom Index.

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WHAT IS AN RSF CAMPAIGN?

CONTEXT:

Press freedom in Algeria is severely restricted. Simply reporting on corruption or protests can result in threats and arrests. The 22-month-long detention of journalist Ihsane El Kadi - an emblematic figure of this repression – ended in November 2023 after he was granted a presidential pardon.

RSF ACTIONS:

→ RSF led a major global campaign for Ihsane El Kadi's release. The NGO filed a petition with the UN Special Rapporteur on Freedom of Opinion and Expression and mobilised 16 prominent editors-in-chief from 14 countries including Nobel laureate Dmitry Muratov - to publicly demand his freedom.

FRFF GUATEMALAN JOURNALIST **JOSE RUBÉN ZAMORA**

GUATEMALA **138^{III}/180***





CONTEXT:

Press freedom is enshrined in the Guatemalan Constitution, yet journalists consistently face government harassment, legal persecution and imprisonment for investigating corruption and human rights violations or criticising the authorities.

Jose Rubén Zamora, founder of elPeriódico, was arrested on such grounds in July 2022. He spent over 800 days in prison before being provisionally released and placed under house arrest in October 2024.

RSF ACTIONS:

→ RSF campaigned for his release from the date of his arrest, conducting multiple fact-finding missions and prison visits in Guatemala. Following the inauguration of President Bernardo Arévalo in January 2024 who pledged his commitment to the freedom of the press, RSF lobbied his administration to prioritise Zamora's release, raising the issue in meetings in Guatemala (July) and New York (September).

FREE

JULIAN ASSANGE

CONTEXT:

Since 2020, WikiLeaks founder Julian Assange had been facing extradition from the UK to the US, where he risked up to 175 years in prison on several counts, all relating to publishing information of public interest. After 1,901 days in London's high-security Belmarsh Prison, he was finally released and returned to Australia, where he is a citizen.

RSF ACTIONS:

→ RSF was the only NGO to monitor the four years of extradition hearings against Julian Assange in the British courts. RSF representatives visited Assange in prison and advocated on his behalf before the US, UK and Australian governments, actively seeking a political resolution to the case.

THE WOMEN JOURNALISTS IMPRISONED IN IRAN





CONTEXT:

Iran is one of the world's most repressive regimes for press freedom, especially since the protests following Mahsa Amini's death on 16 September 2022. Over 70 journalists - many of them women - have been arrested. They include Narges Mohammadi, Niloofar Hamedi, and Elaheh Mohammadi, emblematic symbols of the Iranian "Woman, Life, Freedom" movement that made waves worldwide. Though temporarily released, they risk re-arrest at any moment.

RSF ACTIONS:

→ RSF has tirelessly called for the liberation of the Iranian women journalists arbitrarily imprisoned since September 2022. The NGO notably led an international coalition calling for the immediate release of Nobel Peace Prize laureate Narges Mohammadi.



PROTECTING JOURNALISTS AND JOURNALISM

PROTECTING

JOURNALISTS IN PALESTINE AND LEBANON





CONTEXT:

Palestine is now the world's most dangerous state for journalists, with over 150 reporters killed by the Israeli military since 7 October 2023. At least 41 journalists were deliberately targeted for their reporting.

In Lebanon, the intensification of Israeli bombings made journalism increasingly dangerous and rendered certain areas of the country inaccessible.

RSF ACTIONS:

→ RSF filed a fourth complaint with the International Criminal Court (ICC) for crimes committed by Israel against journalists in Gaza. The case brought by RSF was supported by a wide range of information gathered by its sources on the ground despite the blockade on Gaza and severe communication obstacles within the territory. RSF also opened a regional Press Freedom Centre in Beirut, the capital of Lebanon, to provide journalists and regional media outlets covering the war in Gaza with the equipment, assistance and resources necessary to continue their reporting.



SUPPORTING

JOURNALISTS IN THE SAHEL



CONTEXT:

The security crisis in the Sahel is worsening. Journalists face dangerous direct physical threats and their work is limited by arbitrary administrative restrictions by certain states in the region, notably the expansions of zones that are off-limits to journalists or difficult for them to access.

RSF ACTIONS:

→ In line with its French-language report "What it's like to be a journalist in the Sahel," RSF launched a regional appeal for the protection of the right to reliable information in Bamako, the Malian capital, that was joined by over 500 community radio stations in Sahel and neighbouring countries. Radio spots on the subject were produced in six languages and broadcast with partner stations, and a documentary is currently in the works.

IMPLEMENTING AN ACTION PLAN

TO PROTECT JOURNALISM IN MEXICO





CONTEXT:

Mexico remains one of the world's deadliest countries for journalists, with 37 killed and five disappeared between 2018 and 2024.

RSF ACTIONS:

→ RSF met with Mexican prosecutors; the Under-Secretary of Human Rights, the Population and Migration of the Ministry of the Interior; the Office for the Mechanism for Protection of Human Rights Defenders and Journalists; the Office of Human Rights of the Ministry of Foreign Affairs; and the UN High Commissioner for Human Rights in Mexico, to strengthen international cooperation and obtain technical and political support for initiatives to protect journalists and combat impunity.



DEFENDINGTHE RIGHT TO RELIABLE INFORMATION

ARTIFICIAL INTELLIGENCE AND JOURNALISM



CONTEXT:

Artificial intelligence (AI) offers unprecedented obstacles and opportunities for journalism. Deepfakes risk amplifying disinformation and eroding public trust in audiovisual content, and AI language models that boost productivity also compromise the integrity of online information. In 2024, RSF continued developing strategies to ensure AI serves journalism rather than undermining it.

RSF ACTIONS:

→ RSF was involved in drafting key recommendations on the use of Al in journalism for both European and international institutions. The NGO also developed its own Al tool, Spinoza, designed for and with newsrooms to enhance the capacity of large language models to analyse press reports and legal, technical, and scientific data, with a special focus on climate change reporting. This RSF project is a concrete way to leverage Al for the benefit of journalism.

EXPANDING

THE JOURNALISM TRUST INITIATIVE (JTI)



CONTEXT:

Journalism is in direct competition with manipulative content that spreads unchecked online. This has caused the erosion of audiences, growing public distrust in media, and declining advertising revenue. The Journalism Trust Initiative (JTI) — initiated and implemented by RSF — is the first and only ISO-style international standard for identifying trustworthy sources of information. The JTI provides a transparent framework that combats disinformation and promotes ethical, professional journalism.

RSF ACTIONS:

→ Over 2,000 media outlets across 110 countries have committed to the JTI process by evaluating their transparency and editorial practices. Six hundred of these outlets have reached the stage of the process where they have published transparency reports, and over 100 are officially JTI-certified. The JTI is officially recognised in the European Union (EU) European Media Freedom Act as a benchmark for identifying trustworthy news sources.

| **RESISTING** | **PROPAGANDA**

PREVENTING CHINA'S NEW WORLD ORDER FOR THE INFORMATION SPACE — ESPECIALLY IN HONG KONG

CONTEXT:

China is the world's largest jailer of journalists, and its government is conducting a global crackdown on journalism and the right to reliable information. Once a bastion of press freedom, the special administrative area of Hong Kong has faced an unprecedented decline since Beijing passed its National Security Law in 2020, silencing independent voices.

RSF ACTIONS:

→ Through this campaign, RSF seeks to counter China's attempt to control information and remedy its violations of press freedom, pushing for stronger democratic safeguards. This has included advocacy, high-impact communications campaigns, and supporting the creation of Circle 19, an independent civil society group that promotes the right to reliable information in China by centralising a large swath of intellectual resources on China-related issues. RSF is also actively working to secure the release of Jimmy Lai, the Hong Kong publisher and press freedom champion imprisoned on false charges relating to national security laws.

COUNTERING RUSSIAN PROPAGANDA

CONTEXT:

Since Russia's full-scale invasion of Ukraine on 24 February 2022, almost all independent media in Russia have been banned, blocked, or declared "foreign agents" or "undesirable organisations." The outlets that survived this crackdown now operate under strict military censorship. What's more, Kremlin propaganda has expanded globally and is now deeply embedded across every region of the world.

RSF ACTIONS:

→ To reveal how Russian propaganda is created, spread and evolving, and to raise public awareness on the subject, RSF launched The Propaganda Monitor, a multimedia platform that acts as a resource for raising awareness and combatting propaganda and disinformation, featuring contributions from international experts. RSF also launched Svoboda, a Russian-language satellite TV and radio package in partnership with satellite operator Eutelsat, broadcasting independent journalism to Russia, occupied Ukrainian territories and the Baltic states.

JOURNALISM, ELECTIONS AND DEMOCRACY


UPHOLDING THE INTEGRITY OF ELECTIONS AND INFORMATION

CONTEXT:

2024 was a record-breaking election year, with over half the world's population heading to the polls. Press freedom violations are particularly blatant during elections, as demonstrated by the severe violations against the right to reliable information that took place in the past year in the five most populous countries marked in red in the 2024 World Press Freedom Index.

RSF ACTIONS:

→ RSF issued recommendations urging presidential candidates to commit to press freedom in their countries. The NGO trained many journalists in covering elections, including 60 women journalists in India with the help of local RSF partner NWMI (Network of Women in Media, India). Several reports were published on the subject, including, an exposé of press repression during Venezuela's elections, and the launch of the report "Senegalese Journalism at a Crossroads."



A "NEW DEAL" FOR JOURNALISM IN THE EUROPEAN UNION

CONTEXT:

In the EU, 2024 was marked by European Parliament elections and the finalisation of the European Media Freedom Act (EMFA) — the first-ever EU law dedicated to protecting media freedom.

RSF ACTIONS:

→ One hundred days before the EU elections, RSF proposed 12 key measures for a New Deal for the Right to Reliable Information, which the NGO provided to the candidates. Many of these proposals influenced the EMFA, which now guarantees citizens' right to reliable information across the EU.

MEDIA INDEPENDENCE AND PLURALISM IN FRANCE

CONTEXT:

Media concentration in the hands of a few owners and the increasingly polarised treatment of news is posing major threats to the French media landscape. In 2024, the Council of State, France's highest court, delivered a landmark ruling — prompted by a complaint brought forth by RSF — on media independence and pluralism. The year was also marked by a report by the French General Assembly on Information, and the renewal of broadcast licenses for French digital terrestrial television (DTT).

RSF ACTIONS:

→ The Council of State's historic ruling on 13 February 2024 to annul the decision made by ARCOM (France's audiovisual and digital regulatory authority) to refuse to take action against the television channel *CNews*, which had violated French regulations concerning media pluralism, resulted in a major precedent for pluralism and media independence in France — thanks to the complaint brought by RSF. Following the RSF legal victory, ARCOM was forced to consider the issues brought up in the complaint. RSF recommendations on media independence and pluralism were included in reports by the French National Assembly on DTT regulation and the French Senate on foreign influence on the media. RSF also advocated for journalist **Ariane Lavrilleux**, who faced threats to the confidentiality of her journalistic sources.



2024: RSF IN ACTION I

ASSISTANCE REPORT: PROTECTING EXILED JOURNALISTS IS CRUCIAL FOR PRESS FREEDOM

The 2024 RSF Assistance Report highlighted the scale of forced exile among journalists in a global context of increasing risks for media professionals, particularly in conflict zones. In response to this crisis, RSF allocated 70 per cent of its emergency funds to relocating persecuted journalists worldwide. Supporting exiled journalists has become a fundamental necessity for ensuring the right to reliable information.

KEY FIGURES - RSF ASSISTANCE FOR JOURNALISTS IN 2024

716 journalists

received emergency aid from RSF. Over half of these cases involved journalists from Afghanistan, Russia, Myanmar, Iran and Syria. In 2024,

367 grants

enabled the resettlement of exiled or displaced journalists and media outlets. RSF provided
emergency assistance
to **42** media outlets across **16** countries, **21** of which are
currently operating in exile.

More than 400 journalists

received vital administrative support from RSF for their visa and asylum applications, primarily for relocation to Germany and France.

WHAT IS THE RSF ASSISTANCE OFFICE?

Based in RSF Paris headquarters with an active team in Berlin, the RSF Assistance Bureau implements a comprehensive support system for journalists and media in emergency situations worldwide. This support is primarily delivered in the form of financial and administrative assistance. Needs assessments and case verification are conducted with the support of RSF Bureaus in Dakar, Rio de Janeiro, Taipei and Tunis.

PALESTINE: ICC INCLUDES CRIMES AGAINST JOURNALISTS IN ITS INVESTIGATION THANKS TO RSF

Since the start of the conflict in Gaza on 7 October 2023, RSF has filed four complaints with the International Criminal Court (ICC) — building on prior cases submitted in 2018 and 2021. In January 2024, for the first time since the conflict began, the ICC prosecutor confirmed that crimes against journalists would officially be included in its Palestine investigation.

UKRAINE:

14 preliminary investigations opened for Russian war crimes against journalists. Prompted by the eight complaints RSF filed between 2022 and 2024, the Ukrainian Prosecutor General launched 14 preliminary investigations into Russian war crimes targeting journalists.



OTHER LEGAL ACTION FILED BY RSF IN 2024

- → Eritrea: RSF filed a crime against humanity complaint against the Eritrean president for the detention of **Dawit Isaak**, the journalist imprisoned without trial for the longest period on record.
- → Disinformation on X: After uncovering a disinformation campaign targeting RSF that was circulating on the social media platform X (formerly Twitter), RSF filed a lawsuit for defamation, identity theft and spreading false information. The NGO also lodged a complaint with the European Commission under the Digital Services Act (DSA).
- → RSF also filed a criminal complaint with the Paris public prosecutor for identity theft and deceptive business practices following a widespread smear campaign against the NGO prompted by the Council of State's 13 February 2024 decision in favor of RSF.

RSF IMPACT ON LEGISLATION

POLAND: RSF RECOMMENDATIONS SHAPE PUBLIC MEDIA REFORM

Following an RSF recommendation, the Polish Ministry of Culture partially depoliticised the appointment process for public media executives. The government also acknowledged the need to limit the influence of the National Broadcasting Council (KRRiT) — which is politically controlled — on the selection of board members and editor-in-chiefs in public media.

FRANCE: RSF RECOMMENDATIONS ON MEDIA PLURALISM AND INDEPENDENCE INCORPORATED INTO NATIONAL ASSEMBLY REPORT

RSF was consulted by the National Assembly's Commission on Digital Terrestrial Television (DTT) twice. The NGO presented its recommendations and proposed legal solutions to ensure media pluralism and independence in TNT licensing agreements.

EQUIPPING JOURNALISTS AND MEDIA OUTLETS IN ARMED CONFLICT ZONES

In 2024, **RSF provided equipment to over 640 journalists and 140 media outlets** in conflict zones, where journalism has suffered an exorbitant human cost. RSF also expanded its support programs for journalists, including Press Freedom Centres, to meet the growing demand for protection and resources in high-risk areas.



SUPPORTING NEARLY 130 UKRAINIAN MEDIA OUTLETS AMID WAR

Since Russia's full-scale invasion of Ukraine on 24 February 2022, Ukrainian media have faced unprecedented challenges and worked in extremely difficult conditions, including frequent power outages due to Russian airstrikes on energy infrastructure.

In 2024, RSF distributed energy equipment including generators, charging stations, and external batteries to **129 media outlets and 57 journalists in 16 regions of Ukraine.** These resources allowed Ukrainian journalists to continue reporting despite extremely hostile conditions and constant threats to press freedom.

TRAINING OVER 1,400 JOURNALISTS, INCLUDING 380 IN CONFLICT ZONES

In addition to providing equipment, **RSF trained over 1,400 journalists** in 2024, including **380 journalists working in conflict zones** who received lessons in physical, digital and legal security; election coverage; fact-checking; and disinformation and journalistic reliability. **RSF organised 85 training sessions** in 2024. RSF identified that physical safety remained a priority need among these journalists and almost **50 per cent** of all RSF training was dedicated to protection on the ground. Other subjects included fighting disinformation, journalistic reliability and support for journalists in exile, which is now essential as manipulated content and attacks on the press soar.

SUPPORTING JOURNALISTS

THROUGH PRESS FREEDOM CENTRES AND PROGRAMMES

COMMITMENT TO HELPING THE UKRAINIAN MEDIA: RSF SUPPORTED CLOSE TO 1,900 JOURNALISTS AND 270 MEDIA OUTLETS SINCE 2022

Since Russia's full-scale invasion, RSF has supported 1,900 journalists and 270 media outlets, most notably through its Press Freedom Centres in Lviv and Kyiv. After over 1,000 days of war, to better respond to demand on the ground, RSF centralised the Press Freedom Centres' operations in Kyiv, continuing to provide sustainable aid to media outlets and journalists so they, in turn, can keep providing the public with reliable, independent information.

GAZA WAR: RSF OPENS REGIONAL PRESS FREEDOM CENTRE IN BEIRUT, LEBANON


In March 2024, RSF opened a regional Press Freedom Centre in Beirut, the Lebanese capital, to provide journalists covering Gaza with essential equipment, assistance, and the resources necessary to continue working as safely as possible. The centre acts as a regional hub in Beirut for media outlets across the Middle East, and includes free workspace with internet access for displaced journalists. RSF provides physical and digital security training with local partners, as well as psychological support and legal assistance. It also offers protective gear for journalists covering conflict zones.

THAILAND: RSF LAUNCHES SUPPORT PROGRAM FOR BURMESE JOURNALISTS

In October 2024, to counter the Burmese military junta's brutal crackdown on journalists, RSF launched the Myanmar Press Freedom Project in Chiang Mai, the second-largest city in Thailand. The program supports exiled Burmese journalists as well as journalists still operating inside Myanmar, and provides professional and energy equipment; physical, digital, and psychological safety training; and training in "mobile journalism," the practice of producing journalism with mobile phones.

THE UNUSUAL, AMBITIOUS 2024 EDITIONS OF THE RSF PHOTO ALBUM SERIES 100 PHOTOS FOR PRESS FREEDOM



The year's first issue of the iconic RSF photo albums "100 Photos for Press Freedom," featured the work of Willy Ronis, where a small boy runs down the street, baguette in hand; a naked silhouette peers over a sink; and a worker rallies her co-workers during a factory strike. A master of poetic realism and a committed humanist in his photography, Willy Ronis died in 2009, at almost 100 years old, leaving us a collection of major works steeped in fraternity.



Later in the year, our readers were transported to Japan via an original, extraordinary collection of the oeuvres of fourteen major Japanese and Gaijin photographers. The album features historically famous and contemporary artists alike: Werner Bischof, Nicolas Bouvier, Henri Cartier-Bresson, Ken Domon, Charles Fréger, Masahisa Fukase, Julie Glassberg, Françoise Huguier, Ishiuchi Miyako, Daidō Moriyama, Pierre-Elie de Pibrac, Gueorgui Pinkhassov, Toshio Shibata and Hitomi Watanabe.



The year ended with a touching issue filled with hope. For the first time, "100 Photos for Press Freedom" featured Martine Franck, a cosmopolitan Belgian photographer. The spouse and equal of Henri Cartier-Bresson, friend to Ariane Mnouchkine, member of the Magnum Photos collective and photographer of the French Women's Liberation Movement (MLF), she knew how to wield her gaze, her gentleness and her talent, which stand out in this luminous issue.

RSF: AN ACTIVIST NGO DEFENDING CITIZENS' RIGHT TO RELIABLE INFORMATION

As part of the change in executive management that took place in July 2024, the board of directors asked Thibaut Bruttin, the new RSF director general, and the RSF executive committee to design a new strategy together with all RSF teams, from the employees in the Paris headquarters to the staff of all RSF bureaus and sections. This document was approved in December 2024 and provides a framework for the NGO's development over the next five years.

RSF aims to have an active role in both public debate and on the ground, defending and promoting fact-based journalism and the notion that the right to reliable information is an extension of press freedom. The NGO fights for citizens' ability to access reliable information, which allows them to freely form their own opinions about the world around them. This approach is grounded in the following strategic plan:

PROTECT ENVIRONMENTAL JOURNALISM

→ RSF aims to strengthen the protection and capabilities of journalists covering environmental issues by advocating for environmental journalism and the fight against disinformation to be included in the COP30 Declaration, and promoting environmental investigative reporting.

SUPPORT DISPLACED AND EXILED JOURNALISTS

→ The number of aid requests from exiled journalists has increased dramatically in recent years. This reflects a new reality: repression and safety issues are now so intense that hundreds of media professionals are forced to leave their country to ensure their survival and continue reporting. RSF will focus on raising awareness about journalism in exile beyond the specialised circles already attuned to the issue, making pathways to exile in Europe safer and more accessible for journalists, and strengthening support for media professionals, particularly through the "Voices in Exile" project.

DEFEND PRESS FREEDOM IN INDIA

→ Over the past year, RSF gained coverage in the Indian media landscape due to its strong advocacy efforts. In 2025, RSF will focus on fighting the online harassment against journalists — particularly women and journalists from marginalised communities — that plagues the country.

RSF: 40 YEARS OF FIGHTING FOR PRESS FREEDOM

Since 1985, RSF has been at the forefront of defending the right to reliable information and press freedom. In 2025, RSF will celebrate **40 years of battles,** victories, and innovation in the service of independent, and reliable journalism. To mark this milestone, RSF will host public events worldwide throughout the year.






PARIS TEAM OVERVIEW


RSF has a reinforced presence in several European countries through its national sections, which work closely with information sources, media organisations, advocacy stakeholders and donors to foster collaboration and enhance its impact in Finland, Sweden, Austria, Germany, Switzerland and Spain.

OUR CORRESPONDENTS

RSF has a vast global network that ensures its strong local engagement in **90 per cent of the world's countries.**RSF counts at least one local actor in 161 of the 180 countries it covers. These actors may be correspondents, representatives, local partners or an RSF bureau or section. This global coverage is balanced according to the different geographical zones.

PARTNERS

In 2024, RSF collaborated with **30 local organisations in 25 countries worldwide.** These partnerships allowed RSF to implement projects that promote the safety of women journalists in Niger, Senegal and India.



CHRISTOPHE DELOIRE

Biography:

- 21 May 1971 Born in Paray-le-Monial, a commune in the Saôneet-Loire department of France.
- 1995 Graduated from ESSEC Business School; completed a civic service contract as a media officer at the Berlin bureau of the French television channel *TF1*, and later became a video journalist (JRI) for the Franco-German television channel *Arte*.
- 1998 Joined Le Point magazine, first in the society section, then the politics section, specialising in investigative journalism.
- 2004 Co-authored the investigative book "Les Islamistes sont déjà là" ("The Islamists are Already Here") with Christophe Dubois, exposing radical Islamist networks in France using classified defense documents.
- 2006 Became an editor at the publishing house Flammarion, and published several influential works, including Sexus Politicus (published with Albin Michel, co-authored with Christophe Dubois).
- 2008 Appointed director of the journalism school Centre de Formation des Journalistes (CFJ).
- 2012 Appointed executive director of RSF. Under his leadership, at least 1,655 imprisoned journalists were freed, including Mortaza Behboudi, Olivier Dubois, Marina Ovsiannikova, Mathias Depardon and Can Dündar.
- 2018 Appointed president of the Forum on Information and Democracy, an organisation that oversees the implementation of the International Partnership on Information and Democracy, signed by over 50 countries.
- 2022 Published "La Matrice" ("The Matrix"), a culmination of ten years of advocacy for press freedom which examines the dangers of surveillance capitalism and its impact on democracy.
- 2023 Appointed General Delegate of the General Assembly for Information, a national forum for media reform and press freedom in France.

I TRIBUTE TO CHRISTOPHE DELOIRE I

66 What Christophe left me

To me, Christophe embodied journalism itself. His father once told me that, from a young age, he had two dreams: to be a UN peacekeeper or a journalist. With RSF, he became a bit of both. He had an unwavering love for this profession and its vital role as a trusted intermediary in society.

Christophe had a sharp instinct for ideas – the kind that drive a society, that spark public debate. He had an insatiable hunger for bringing these ideas to the forefront, setting them in motion and making them resonate.

He spoke to everyone and addressed all audiences. He was a master of dialogue, of public debate. He ventured into places where he was neither expected nor welcomed. He spoke in Saudi Arabia. He appeared on the set of *CNews*.

Christophe learned to challenge himself, to think against his own instincts, always seeking nuance. He tackled the dangers of radical Islamism, yet never became Islamophobic. He criticised the European elite, yet never turned Eurosceptic. Until the very end, he remained true to his deepest conviction: universalism.

Now, we stand without him – but we are filled with his legacy. At RSF, each of us carries a piece of Christophe. There is still so much to do and we must do it together. Christophe carved a path for us to follow, and it is up to us to carry the torch of press freedom forward."
